Majority of Canadians prefer an independent Senate

CANADA

A strong majority of Canadians believe that the Senate of Canada should be a non-partisan body where Senators are independent and not required to vote along party lines. Canadians hold generally positive impressions Members of Parliament, while they hold more negative opinions of Senators. Representing all of Canada's interests is the most important element to maintaining a strong democracy. The most mentioned recommendations for the Senate are to make the position of Senator an elected position or to abolish the Senate.

Canadians and Federal Politics

- Eight out of ten Canadians report following federal politics closely or somewhat closely When asked if they follow federal politics, eight out of ten of Canadians say they follow it closely (33%) or somewhat closely (48%). While fourteen per cent say they follow somewhat not closely and four per cent say they do not follow closely at all.
- Just over half of Canadians have positive or somewhat positive impressions of Members of Parliament When asked of their impression of someone who is a Member of Parliament, over one in five of Canadians say their impressions are positive (11%, down from 19% in 2016) or somewhat positive (41%). Nearly one in four Canadians say they have negative (24%) or somewhat negative (14%, an increase from 8% in 2016) impressions. Ten per cent are unsure.
- The most cited reason for their positive impressions of MPs related to their ridings Canadians most frequently stated that MPs worked hard for their ridings (15%). The next most cited reason is that it's not an easy job and MPs are under a lot of public scrutiny (13%). The most cited reason for negative impressions is that they do not like/or agree with their MP (48%) followed by that MPs are being paid too much/entitled/in it for themselves (10%).

Senate of Canada

 Ineffective and a waste of money come to mind for Canadians when thinking of the Senate – When asked what words come to mind when thinking of the Senate of Canada, unprompted, 21 per cent of Canadians said ineffective/pointless, followed by a waste of money (12%), outdated (seven per cent), and a place of balance of power and second thought on laws (seven per percent).

Keeping democracy strong in Canada

Canadians were asked how important specific elements were to keeping democracy strong in Canada, and rated them from 1 (not at all important) to 5 (very important).

- Just under seven in ten Canadians rated having government legislation and policies independently reviewed as important - When asked, 68 per cent say that independent reviews are important (4-5), while 18 per cent say it is of average importance (3) and 10 per cent say it is not important (1-2). Five per cent are unsure. The mean score is four out of five. There are no significant differences with previous waves of the research.
- More than half of Canadians say having reasonable representation of women and minorities is important When asked how important it is to have reasonable representation of women and minorities in parliament, 57 per cent say it is important (4-5), while 20 percent say it is of average importance (3), and 22 per cent say is it not important (1-2). One per cent are unsure. The mean score is 3.6 out of five. No significant differences were recorded from previous waves of research.

A majority of Canadians say that giving voice to Canada's regions is important to a strong democracy – When asked, Canadians said that giving a voice is important (4-5) (78%), while 13 per cent say it is of average importance (3), and seven say it is not important (1-2). Two percent are unsure. The mean score is 4.2 out of five. Results are consistent with previous waves of research.

Keeping democracy strong in Canada

- A strong majority of Canadians say that representing the interests of all Canadians is important When asked if representing all Canadian interests is important to a strong democracy, 85 per cent say that it is important (4-5 on a five point scale). Only nine per cent say it is of average importance (3 out of five), while five per cent say it is not important (1-2 out of five). One per cent is unsure. The mean score is 4.4 out of five. There are no significant differences from the previous wave's score.
- Just over six in ten Canadians say that allowing more free votes will keep Canada's democracy strong- Sixty-four per cent of Canadians (compared to 74% in 2016) say that allowing more free votes is important (4-5 out of five), while 16 per cent say it is of average importance (3 out of five) and nine per cent say it is not important (1-2 on a five point scale). Eleven per cent are unsure. The mean score is four out of five.

Canadians' impressions of the Senate

- Three quarters of Canadians say that they are familiar or somewhat familiar with the role of the Senate When asked about their familiarity with the Senate's role, three in four Canadians say they are familiar (28%) or somewhat familiar (47%). The rest say they are unfamiliar (nine per cent) or somewhat not familiar (16%). This is consistent with the findings of the 2016 wave.
- Just under six in ten Canadians say that they hold a negative or somewhat negative impression of someone who is a Senator – When asked what impression they have about someone who is a Senator, three in eight Canadians say that they have a negative (21%) or somewhat negative (37%) impression about someone who is a Senator. A quarter say that they have a positive (four per cent) or somewhat positive (21%), while 18 per cent are unsure.
- The most frequently cited reasons for their impressions of Senators is that the Senate is too partisan, not useful, and is appointed The most frequently cited reason is that it is too partisan/ unaccountable/ entitled (21%), followed by the opinion that the Senate is not useful and that it doesn't accomplish much (11%), and that because the Senate is an unelected and/ or an appointed body (nine per cent).

Senate of Canada working well

- A majority of Canadians say they prefer a Senate where the Senators are independent and are able to vote independently When asked which three paths the Senate should take, 71 per cent of Canadians say that being independent and voting independently is the path the Senate should take, followed by Senators are members of a Party Caucus and vote independently of their party (13%), and Senators are members of a Party Caucus and vote consistently with their Party (six per cent). Ten per cent are unsure of which path is best to take. There are no significant differences from the previous waves.
- Nearly half of Canadians say that the Senate is functioning the same as it did five years ago When asked to compare the Senate's functioning compared to five years ago, 48 per cent of Canadians say that the Senate is functioning the same, while 18 per cent say it is functioning better, and 15 per cent say it is functioning worse. Twenty per cent are unsure.
- One in five Canadians recommend that Senators be elected When asked unprompted, if they had one recommendation to improve the Senate, the top three most mentioned recommendations are to make the Senators electable (20%), followed by abolishing the Senate (19%), and change the appointment criteria/ process/ enforce term limits (12%). Also recommended are: mandate that Senators sit as independents/ Make sure Senators are not affiliated with parties (9%), ensure that the Senate is more accountable/ transparent (five percent), have better communication/ education to the public about what they do and their activities (two per cent), have effective enforcement of Senators' codes of ethics and conduct, their rules and discipline (two per cent), that it needs a complete reform or overhaul (one per cent), and to increase or change the Senate's powers (one per cent). Two per cent don't know enough about the Senate to make recommendations or had none. Twenty-three per cent are unsure. This is consistent with the previous wave.

Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,000 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between March 7th and 12th, 2018 as part of an omnibus survey. The results were statistically checked and weighted by age and gender using the latest Census information and the sample is geographically stratified to be representative of Canada. The margin of error for a random survey of 1,000 Canadians is ±3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.




Canadians and federal politics





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Impressions of Members of Parliament

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

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

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



Familiarity with role of the Senate

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


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QUESTION – Would you say that you are familiar, somewhat familiar, somewhat unfamiliar or unfamiliar with the role of the Senate of Canada in the federation?


Familiarity with role of the Senate

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Impression of Senators

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










Preferred path for Senate


QUESTION – Based on what you have heard or seen, would you say that the Senate of Canada is functioning better, the same or worse compared to five years ago?

Methodology

Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,000 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between March 7th and 12th, 2018 as part of an omnibus survey. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and administered a survey online. The results were statistically checked and weighted by age and gender using the latest Census information and the sample is geographically stratified to be representative of Canada.

Individuals were randomly called using random digit dialling with a maximum of five call backs.

The margin of error for a random survey of 1,000 Canadians is ± 3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

The research was commissioned by Senator McCoy and was conducted by Nanos Research.

Previous wave: Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,003 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between March 31st and April 4th, 2016, 2016 as part of an omnibus survey. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and administered a survey online. The margin of error for a random survey of 1,000 Canadians is ±3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

Previous wave: Nanos Research conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) random telephone survey of 1,003 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between January 3rd and 7th, 2009 as part of an omnibus survey. The margin of error for a random survey of 1,003 Canadians is ±3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.
